During the years, 2018, 2019, Uganda Peoples Defense Forces identified, collected and demolished tons of UXOs (in 2018, 100 tons of UXOs were destroyed. In 2019, 157 tons of UXOs and 101 tons of Commercial explosives were demolished) tried to indicate this in the boxes provided but could not be saved.

However, in terms of opportunities, the Government of Uganda is wholly committed in the implementation of the UNPoA and ITI by ensuring that all Firearms in state and non state owned are marked for easy tracing. In addition to marking there are recent efforts to develop a forensic database for all firearms in the country to ease on identification of firearms involved in crime. The country is in advance stages to review the firearms law and make it punitive for those who misuse and abuse firearms
